
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
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MEET OUR CLINICIANS

Gene Aulinger - Concert Bands



Gene and his wife Diane moved to North Battleford in 1988. Gene currently administers a community string program, and maintains a private studio of students. Until his retirement in 2004, Gene was the Music Consultant with the Living Sky School Division. After retiring from classroom work, he accepted a position as the Arts Consultant for the division. Previous to his time in the Battlefords, he was a full time Band Director with the Kindersley School Division for fourteen years.

At the University of Wisconsin he completed a B.A. in performance and received his Teaching Credentials. He went on to complete six credits of post grad work at the University of Saskatchewan, with Marvin Eckroth and Margaret Wilson. These courses were transferred to Northwestern State University in Louisiana, where he completed a M.M. in 1998. As a member of the Board of SMEA, he chaired the Provincial SMEA Convention in 1991 and has coordinated the SMEA Honour Groups five different years. SMEA awarded

Gene the Outstanding Achievement Award in 1996, and SMEA Honourary Life Membership in 2005. Gene has served on the Board of the Saskatchewan Band Association. He received the SBA Distinguished Band Director Award in 2005.

In 2006 and 2010, he was a guest presenter at the Sask. Music Conference. North Battleford bands have given performances, and been selected as demonstration groups for clinicians and speakers at several Sask. Music Conferences. The North Battleford Band, combined with the band from Salisbury Composite in Sherwood Park, performed at two conferences, as well as premiering the commissioned work, "Riel", written by Rick Benson. Gene has adjudicated festivals and led workshops in Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, Wisconsin and Louisiana. During these events, his goal has been to create an appreciation of music and performing. He has performed several recitals on clarinet of nineteenth and twentieth century literature, and has recently been a guest performer with the Gallery Singers, the Kinsmen Senior Band, Battlefords Sax Quartet, Battlefords Clarinet Quartet, and Battlefords Woodwind Quintet.

Larry Pearen - Concert Bands



Larry Pearen is a clinician, adjudicator, and educator, who was responsible for all bands at the Yorkton Regional High School until his retirement. His concert and jazz bands were award winners at local, provincial and Musicfest Canada National Finals. His school bands have traveled extensively throughout Canada and the United States performing in the 1998 Tournament of Roses Parade, Pasadena, Disneyland, and Universal Studios California, MGM Theme Park in Las Vegas, Disney World, Universal Studios Florida and on Parliament Hill in Ottawa as well as in six Canadian Football League Grey Cup Parades, Pre Game and Half Time Shows.

Mr. Pearen is a graduate of the University of Saskatchewan, University of Regina and has taken graduate level classes at several American Universities. He is the founding director of both the Yorkton Community Concert and ALL THAT JAZZ Big Bands of which

he continues to direct.

He is a past president of the Canadian Band Association, the Saskatchewan Band Association, former CBA National Youth Band of Canada manager, Professional Development Coordinator for Musicfest Canada and coordinated a junior band camp for eleven years.

He was awarded an Honorary Life membership in the Phi Beta Mu International Bandmasters Fraternity in Chicago and was awarded an Honorary Life Membership in the Canadian Band Association with the CBA National Music Award for his work and leadership with bands in Canada. In 2005 he was awarded a Saskatchewan Centennial Medal for his community leadership, and in 2017 awarded the Canada 150 Medal as a "Community Builder" by MP Cathay Wagantall. Larry was selected as the 2017 Citizen of the Year by Yorkton This Week newspaper. In 2020 he received the Saskatchewan Band Association "Life Membership Award" in recognition of his significant and lasting contribution towards the promotion and development of band programs in the province of Saskatchewan. In 2023 he was awarded the Queen Elizabeth II Platinum Jubilee Medal for volunteer service.

Larry and his wife Sonia, a retired pharmacist, have two married daughters and enjoy their five grandchildren who are all participating in music programs.



Daryl Ferguson - Concert Bands

Darryl Ferguson teaches at Acadia Junior High School in Winnipeg, MB, where he directs four concert bands and a jazz ensemble. The Acadia band program consistently receives recognition for outstanding performance at festivals across western Canada and the northern United States. The Acadia band program has received the George Douglas Award from the Winnipeg International Optimist Concert Band Festival and was the first junior high program to be awarded the Optimist Festival's Jazz Award. Acadia's grade 9 ensembles participated in the Canadian Music Educators' Association's performance awards program, in which they were awarded the Robert Rosevear Award for the most outstanding junior high concert band and the Don Wright Award for the most outstanding junior high jazz band performances nationally.

Darryl is active as an adjudicator, guest conductor, clinician, and freelance trumpet player and private teacher. He also serves as a sessional instructor and applied trumpet teacher at Canadian Mennonite University. He is the conductor of the Rupertsland Brass Band. Darryl is highly involved in the Manitoba music education community. He is involved in many Manitoba Band Association initiatives. In 2021, Darryl was awarded the Manitoba Band Association's Award of Distinction in recognition of his outstanding contribution to music education in Manitoba. In 2018, Darryl was awarded the Fort Richmond MLA Community Hero Certificate for his service in the communityDarryl resides in Winnipeg with his wife Cheryl and their sons Sam and Nate.



Glen Gillis - Concert Bands

Glen Gillis is Professor of Music at the University of Saskatchewan. He teaches conducting, saxophone, and music education courses, conducts the Concert Band and saxophone ensembles, and works with graduate students in music education and performance streams. He remains active as a clinician/adjudicator for solo/ensemble festivals as well as conducting engagements. Dr. Gillis is a Conn-Selmer Artist/Clinician and has performed in North America, Continental Europe, Iceland, and China. Recently he and James Cunningham, aka Duo Gillis Cunningham (DGC) presented a lecture/performance at the TEDx USASK 2023.

As an educator his career began in the Saskatoon Public Schools where his concert and jazz ensembles received numerous awards for their advanced musical performances. At the university level his career continued in Missouri and Oklahoma where he conducted concert/jazz bands and the Lawton Philharmonic. Upon returning to Canada, he directed

the U of S Wind Orchestra from 2001-2010 and released three commercial albums in 2005, 2007, and 2009, and guest conducted the Saskatoon Symphony Orchestra on four occasions. In 2006, the Wind Orchestra performed at the Texas Music Educators Convention. In 2004 he created the High School Select Wind Orchestra, and in 2005 the North Saskatchewan Wind Symphony.

His articles appear in the Canadian Music Educator and Canadian Winds. He has contributed to Teaching Music through Performance in Band (Vol. X), Teaching Music through Performance in Middle School Band, and The Encyclopedia of Music in Canada. He presented research papers at international venues such as The Midwest Clinic, the World Association of Symphonic Bands and Ensembles, Regional and National College Band Directors National Conferences, the Texas Music Educators Conference, the Hawaii International Arts/Humanities Conference, and the British Forum for Ethnomusicology.

To date he has 14 compositions for wind band and 30+ for saxophone – distributed through Eighth Note Publications, Cimarron Music Press, and GG Music (self -published). He released SaxSpectrum (2009), SaxSpectrum 2 (2014, nominated for Instrumental Recording of the Year by the Western Canadian Music Awards), and SaxSpectrum 3 (2021 double album) through MSR Classics label performing many of his compositions. He co-released DGC Sonic Eclipse (2020) with James Cunningham on Hoot/Wisdom Recordings (Boca Raton, Florida).

Dr. Gillis' affiliations include WASBE, CBDNA, SBA/CBA, SMEA/CMEA, NAfME, SOCAN, NASA, Kappa Kappa Psi, Phi Mu Alpha, and Pi Kappa Lambda. He earned a BMEd from the University of Saskatchewan, a MMEd from Northwestern University, and a Ph.D. from the University of Missouri.



Donny Kennedy - Jazz Bands

Recently returned to Regina Saskatchewan (July 2022) after 27 years in Montreal, Donny Kennedy has joined the Regina Catholic School Division teaching Band in the Leboldus area and is also teaching Jazz History and Appreciation at the University of Regina. Donny moved to Montreal, Quebec in 1995 to pursue a jazz performance degree at McGill University. After graduating with high distinction in jazz saxophone, Kennedy continued his studies at McGill. He was awarded the graduate level entry scholarship to pursue a Master of Music in Jazz Performance. Donny received his Master's degree in April of 2001.

Donny leads and composes for his own Sextet. The Donny Kennedy Sextet toured Mexico as part of Festival Internacional Cervantino. This group was also nominated for the GM Grand Prix de Jazz at the Montreal International Jazz Festival in 2003. In 2001, the group was chosen as one of five groups to perform in Toronto as part of a

Canada Council initiative to promote emerging Canadian jazz artists. The group has released one recording entitled Horizons. The disc features original compositions by Kennedy. Donny has also recently embarked on a new quartet project (The Kennedy/McLeod Quartet). This group has one released recording entitled, Belaney's Secret.

Donny taught at McGill University's Schulich School of Music for 22 years and St. George's School of Montreal for 15 years. At McGill, he taught Basic Jazz Arranging, Jazz Saxophone, Jazz Materials, Basic Materials of Jazz, Jazz Orchestra III, Jazz Philosophy and Instruction, Graduate Jazz Pedagogy and Jazz Combo. He was also the Jazz Combo Coordinator at McGill University. In 2021, Donny was awarded both the Schulich School of Music Teaching Award, and the Principal's Prize for Excellence in Teaching from McGill University. Kennedy has also taught Saxophone at Bishop's University. He has also directed the Jazz Ensemble at Camp Musicale d'Asbestos (English session) and is a regular faculty member of the annual Prairielands Jazz Camp in Regina, Saskatchewan.

Donny remains active as a freelance musician, clinician, and teacher in Canada. He is a D'Addario Canada endorsed artist. He has performed with Kevin Dean, Andre White, Kirk MacDonald, Joe Sullivan, Remi Bolduc, Josh Rager, Steve Kaldestad, Janis Steprans, Kieran Overs, Christine Jensen, Paul Nedzela, The Montreal Jazz Big Band and many other local musicians. He is also a member of the Min Rager Quintet. This group has recorded two CD's entitled Bright Road and First Steps. Donny also plays lead alto saxophone in both the Joe Sullivan Big Band and the Juno award winning Christine Jensen Jazz Orchestra.



Stella Salido-Porter - Choral - Strings

Born and raised in Saskatchewan, Stella Salido-Porter has performed throughout North America, including Toronto, Los Angeles, and New York. Her first love was musical theatre, and she received a certificate in Professional Training in Musical Theater from the American Musical and Dramatic Academy in New York City.

Stella also had a passion for Classical music, which she then furthered with extensive vocal training. She earned a Bachelor of Music Performance degree and a Master of Music Degree in vocal performance studies at the University of Regina under the tutelage of Professor Lynn Channing. Stella has participated in master classes with many notable teachers including Mary Lou Fallis, Nico Castel and Stewart Hamilton. Stella has made numerous guest appearances in Classical and Musical Theatre performance, including musical productions with Regina's Globe Theatre, the Mae

Wilson Theatre in association with Diversified Theatre, Live out Loud Theatre, Moose Jaw Cultural Arts Centre, and Rhubarb Productions Inc. Some of her favourite theatre rolls include Penny/Henrietta in Honk!, the Aya in Secret Garden, Gabrielle in Rogers and Hammerstein's Cinderella, Mrs. Banks in Mary Poppins, and performing in Christmas Pantomimes. Stella has also sung several Oratorio works as guest soprano with the Regina Symphony Orchestra and players such as Haydn's The Creation, Gabriel Faure's Requiem in D Op.48, J.S Bach's Cantata No.4, A New Creation by Rene Clausen and Schubert's Mass in G.

Stella currently resides in Moose Jaw with her husband, Derek and two sons, Jaylon and Micah. She maintains an active career in performance, runs a busy private studio teaching vocal performance, violin and flute, and serves as a Musical theatre voice instructor for the Doris Sitter School of Dance. Stella is very happy to be invited to participate in Moose Jaw's Band and Choral Festival.



Jennifer Switzer - Concert Bands

Jennifer Switzer has been teaching in the Swift Current area for the last 23 years and currently is the director of the Chinook School Division's Prairie West Bands. She is a University of Saskatchewan graduate with Bachelor of Music and Bachelor of Education degrees with great distinction. Jennifer has been a guest conductor and clinician at several SBA Summer Band Camps, various Junior Honour Bands and the RCSD Select Band. She has worked as an adjudicator and has coordinated a variety of musical activities in Saskatchewan. In 2016, she was the recipient of the Saskatchewan Music Educators Association Outstanding Achievement Award. She currently lives in Swift Current with her husband, Glenn and her kids, Ty and Jodi.



Nick Fanner - Concert Bands

Having retired after 31 years of teaching elementary and secondary band within the Saskatoon Public School Division, Nick continues to be very active in music education, directing the Saskatoon Youth Jazz Orchestra (which he formed in 2017), as well as the Saskatoon Community Bands intermediate concert band and beginner jazz band.

Mr. Fanner has directed several Junior's; Intermediate Honour Bands in Saskatchewan, most recently the Regina Public Schools Junior Select Band in February 2023. He continues to be a member of the staff at the Prairielands Jazz Camp in Regina, having done so since 2002.

As a sessional lecturer at the University of Saskatchewan, Mr. Fanner has team taught courses in Instrumental Music Teaching in Secondary School, and Brass

Techniques (Trumpet), in addition to teaching Jazz Pedagogy and Jazz History. He has also served many times as an instructor at the annual U of S High School Select Jazz program.

Nick has adjudicated/workshopped concert bands in Saskatchewan, Alberta, and, most recently, at the 46th Annual Manitoba Band Association International Band Festival in Winnipeg in February 2023. He continues to be a member of the trumpet section of the Saskatoon Jazz Orchestra for many of each season's performances.

Mr. Fanner is honoured to be the recipient of the 2022 SaskTel Saskatchewan Jazz Festival Special Recognition Award and the 2019 Saskatchewan Band Association's Distinguished Band Director Award.



Chad Huel - Jazz Bands

Chad graduated with a B.Mus.Ed from the University of Regina in Regina, Saskatchewan, Canada in 2000. Chad taught the Regina Lions Band from 1993-2003. This was an extra-curricular type of organization which provided opportunities such as Concert Band, Jazz Band, Winter Drumline, Winter Color Guard, and Marching Band.

Chad is in his 23rd year of teaching. He is in his 8th year with Regina Catholic Schools and Band Director at LeBoldus Catholic HighSchool. Chad was the former Band Director at Winston Knoll High School and surrounding elementary schools in Regina for 10 years previous to this. Chad has been a clinician throughout Regina and Saskatchewan for many years.

Under his direction, his bands consistently receive superior ratings at

festivals such as the Downtowners Optimist Band Festival and the Moose Jaw Kinsman Band Festival. Chad is the Past-President of the Saskatchewan Band Association and he also sits on numerous other committee's such as the Optimist Band Festival Committee and the Prairielands Jazz Camp committee. He is in his 5th year teaching at the University of Regina, directing Jazz 2. Chad is currently pursuing his Masters in Conducting Degree from the University of Regina.



Stuart Sladden - Choral

Dr. Stuart Sladden was born and raised in the Greater Toronto Area. He holds a Bachelor of Music degree from the University of Toronto (2002), in vocal jazz performance, a Master of Music degree from the University of Manitoba (2012), and a Doctor of Music degree from the University of Alberta (2020), both in choral conducting. He is a freelance musician, appearing as a guest conductor, workshop leader, adjudicator, and clinician mainly throughout Canada. He has worked as a sessional instructor at both the University of Alberta and University of Manitoba teaching courses in aural skills, conducting, and choral literature, and is part of the handbell faculty at the International Music Camp.

Over the past twenty-five years, Stuart has enjoyed working with a variety of traditional, jazz, and church choirs as both a singer and conductor. In Winnipeg, he conducts a number of ensembles, including the Joie de Vivre Community Choir, the Good Neighbours Choristers, and the Rochester Ringers, he was recently appointed as the new Director of Music in Worship at Westminster United Church, and is a singer with one of Winnipeg's professional choral ensembles, the Winnipeg Singers.

Along with his teaching and choral work, Stuart is passionate about building

relationship and community through choir. He has been the chair of ChoralFest, one of the largest stand-alone, non-competitive choral festivals in Manitoba, has served on the Manitoba Music Educators Association board, serves on the board of the Foundation for Choral Music in Manitoba, and is the current Past-President of the Manitoba Choral Association.

The Moose Jaw Band and Choral Festival is honoured to be able to remember music educators who have passed, but not before leaving a legacy of making a difference in music education in the province. We dedicate our venues to the memories of the following:



Jacquie Ackerman - Zion United Church - Choral

Jacquie Ackerman grew up on a farm near Chamberlain, SK, and attended Lindale and Peacock schools in Moose Jaw, graduating from the University of Saskatchewan with a degree in music education. She went on to complete a Master's Degree in Music from Northwestern University in Louisiana, and a Master's Degree in Educational Administration from the U of S.

Jacquie taught at Holy Cross High School in Saskatoon for 13 years before becoming an administrator and subsequently working in several Greater Saskatoon schools, most recently as Assistant Principal at Bethlehem Catholic High School. She was passionate about helping students reach their potential, and was recognized for her excellence by receiving the 2014 YWCA's Woman of Distinction Award for Education.

In addition to her work in education, Jacquie was well known for her involvement in the arts community. In her schools, and with gateway Players and Saskatoon Summer Players, she was choral coach, musical director, and actress. She served as a board member for the Saskatchewan Choral Federation, Saskatchewan Music Educators' Association, the Saskatoon Symphony, and also served as chair of the Diocese of

Saskatoon's Bishop's Gala. Jacquie was an amazing soprano, and was a member of the Greystone Singers, Saskatoon Chamber Singers, and was actively involved in music ministry in her schools and parish.



Frank Connell - Mae Wilson Theatre - Concert Band

Frank Connell was born in Schotts, Scotland and began his musical training from his father, a cornet virtuoso. He qualified for his Bandmastership in 1946 from Kneller Hall which led to appointments with several British military bands prior to moving to Moose Jaw in 1958 to become director of the Moose Jaw Lion's Junior Bands.

Frank's enthusiastic guidance, untiring efforts, and inspiration culminated in leading the Lion's A Band on trips overseas in 1964 and 1970, when they were guest band at the Edinburgh Royal Highland Show and received a gold medal at the International Festival of Music in Kerkrade, Holland. In 1973 Mr Connell moved to Red Deer, AB to become director of bands.

Mr Connell founded the Saskatchewan Music Camps which later became known as the Saskatchewan School of the Arts. 1965 & 66 witnessed the real beginning of the school when the band programme was joined by orchestra, drama, writing, and painting. Frank was the director of the school until 1972. Throughout all of this, he was in demand as a

clinician, served as a member on the Saskatchewan Arts Board, was President of the Canadian Bandmasters Association, was awarded the Order of Canada, and voted citizen of the year in both Moose Jaw and Red Deer. Mr Connell passed away on January 19, 1979. His influence as a music educator has had a huge ripple effect, with many of his students becoming music educators, professional performers, and composers but, most importantly lovers of music.



Beverly Shore - St Andrew United Church - Concert Band

Beverley Ann Shore was born on April 1, 1960 in Regina, Saskatchewan. She received her elementary, high school and university education in Regina, graduating in 1985 with a Bachelor of Music Education Degree. She taught in Watrous, Deloraine, Manitoba and Yorkton. Beverley's devotion to her students was second to none.

Beverley was very active in the Saskatchewan Band Community. She was an SBA Board Member and worked at several SBA Band Camps for over 20 years, always enjoying the opportunity to work with the students and staff. Beverley was also a valuable contributor to the local music festival scene and at the time of her death was President of the Yorkton Music Festival.

Colin Grunert - St Aidan Anglican Church - Jazz Band

Colin Grunert was a band director in Saskatchewan for 29 years. Graduating from Minot State University in 1980, he subsequently took a position in Long Lake School Division for three years, then moved to Estevan. Through the years, he taught band from grade 6-12 until his death in 2009. His bands included concert band, jazz band, marching band, drum line, pep bands at sporting events, and pit bands for musical productions. The ensembles he conducted received recognition locally, provincially, nationally, and internationally. Colin personally received awards including the first recipient of Musicfest Canada's Keith Mann Award, Saskatchewan Band Association's Distinguished Band Director, and the Paul Harris Fellow by the Estevan Rotary Club for Community Service.

Colin had a strong commitment to the Community of Estevan and was particularly involved in his support of the United Way, Estevan Rotary Club, Estevan Exhibition Association, and Estevan Bruins Hockey Club.

One of his pet projects was Saskatchewan Band Association's Kenosee Summer Band Camp, the only residential summer band camp in Saskatchewan.

Colin's hobbies outside of band and community included construction work and watching his children in their various activities. He was especially proud of his family, his wife, Stacy and children, Patrick(Laura), Sheena(Nathan), Alyssa(Evan) and Matthew(Brooke).

The family is delighted that the Moose Jaw Band and Choral Festival is honouring him in this way.



Greg McLean - Peacock Centennial Auditorium - Concert Band

Greg grew up on the family farm in Manitoba, graduated from the University of Brandon, and with wife Marcia, raised 3 children while achieving outstanding success with his School Band programs in Esterhazy and Swift Current. In addition to his School Band programs, Greg was a founding member of the Saskatchewan Band Association. He served on the SBA Board of Directors, was a clinician and conductor at SBA Band Camps for over 25 years and provided ongoing mentorship to new band directors.

Greg also conducted the Swift Current Oratorio Choir and directed the Swift Current Jazz Orchestra, an ensemble he established. In 2011-2012, Greg

became the Interim Director of Bands at the University of Regina. Greg loved to share his leadership and conducting skills with University Interns, and Honour Band participants in Manitoba, Alberta, Saskatchewan and even PEI. Over the years he was also a valued adjudicator, guest conductor and clinician at numerous Band Festivals across Canada. Greg lived his passion and pursuit of excellence as a Band Director, encouraging and inspiring Band students of all ages, to play and be their best at all times.

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
